A note from your CEO

People often ask me to explain the difference between a food bank and a food pantry. In its simplest terms, as a food bank, Food Share is a logistical hub. To imagine it visually, we're the center of a wire-spoked wheel. We acquire and store huge quantities of food in our warehousing space (18.5 million pounds last year alone). Surrounding us are the spokes of the wheel, namely the food pantries and other community-based organizations we partner with to distribute that food (at no cost to those partners), providing sustainable support to communities in need.

As you'll read about in this issue of the Harvester, Food Share also distributes food directly to the community via weekly drive-thru events, and at "mega" distributions like the one we recently held to support the farmworker community. More about that on pages 4-5. Again, we are the hub, partnering with numerous spokes – on this occasion with the United Farmworkers Foundation, the Mixteco/Indigena Community Organizing Project, and Reiter Affiliates, among others.

All this adds up to a wealth of critical relationships across our county and beyond – the hub and

## **One Thousand Food Distributions** and counting!

Food Share hit an impactful but sobering new milestone this summer – the organization's one-thousandth emergency food box distribution. These boxes contain pantry items like rice and beans and canned proteins like tuna, and are supplemented with fresh produce and dairy products.

The distributions began at the start of the pandemic in April 2020, initially to offset the closure of many of Food Share's network of pantry partners at a time of soaring need. Three years later, and with 1 in 4 people experiencing food insecurity in Ventura County in 2022, Food Share decided to continue the distributions for the foreseeable future.

### **COLLEGE PARK NUMBERS SWELL**

The largest is the drive-thru held every Wednesday afternoon at College Park, Oxnard, drawing more than 900 cars each week.

Kevin Herold, Food Sourcing Supervisor at Food Share, has been running the distribution for the past three years and is a familiar friendly face for many of the people in line. "The number of people trailed off a little with the stimulus payments, but now that CalFresh has been cut back to prepandemic levels and inflation remains high, we're seeing lots of new faces." he commented.

Kevin estimates at least a third of the cars contain families with children, and at least as many are older.

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## FARMWORKERS **FACING HARDSHIP**

Farmworkers also make up a significant number of the people attending the weekly drive-thru. There are an estimated 42,000 farmworkers in Ventura County, and the deluge of rain through the first months of this year put many out of work for an extended period, causing significant hardship.

To provide additional support to these essential workers, Food Share recently partnered with the Cabrillo Economic Development Corporation, the United Farmworkers Foundation, the Mixteco/ Indigena Community Organizing Project, Reiter Affiliates, County of Ventura Farmworker Resource Group, and the Rio School District to hold a "mega distribution" for farmworker families.

The event served 1.004 families totaling a little over 4,100 people.

## Program Spotlight Partnering for Public Health

In the past year, with the support of grant funding from Dignity Health, Food Share has been proud to partner with several non-profit organizations working at the intersection of food insecurity and public health in Ventura County.

With 1 in 4 people in Ventura County seeking support from Food Share in 2022, the issue of food insecurity is widespread. "But food insecurity

isn't only about not having enough food," notes Caitlin Barringer, Program Manager at Food Share. "It's about lack of access to nutritious food which, in turn, causes people to experience poorer physical health and an increase in stress, depression, and anxiety. These collaborations go quite literally to the heart of this issue!"

### **Gabriel's House:** Improving Food Security Among Homeless Women and their Families

Gabriel's House is a non-profit providing emergency shelter, transition living, counseling, life skills, and career development for low and very-low-income homeless women, their children, and female Transition Age Youth from across Ventura County. Food Share's nutrition educator, Yolanda Alvarez, has been leading monthly classes on nutrition, including how to shop for healthy food on a budget, the meaning of different "food groups" and the importance of a balanced diet, and how to prepare a range of easy, delicious, and healthy recipes.

### **The Healthy Hearts Project: Helping Prevent Chronic Illness** Among the Uninsured

According to the CDC, heart disease is the leading cause of death in the United States. The prevention of chronic conditions through the promotion of healthy lifestyles is a focus of the **Corazones Sanos Project** (the Healthy Hearts Project), a collaboration between Food Share, Westminster Free Clinic – a non-profit focused on providing free, preventative health services to Ventura County's uninsured individuals & families – students from Cal State University Northridge, and the American Diabetes Association.

Over the course of 30 weeks, Food Share is providing food boxes containing heart and diabetes-friendly, shelf-stable items and fresh produce, plus incentives for WFC's nutrition education class for Westminster patients identified as being at high risk for chronic disease. WFC also runs a weekly food pantry at its Thousand Oaks and Oxnard locations.



Having access to heart healthy food our doctors, dietitian, and other health care practitioners recommend to our patients is essential for them to be well. Our partnership with Food Share makes it possible for WFC to give out free, nutritious food to 500 families coming for services each week, so all people have a chance to be healthy and Director of WFC, said: thrive.
