A note from your CEO

As we approach the season of giving, I look forward to gathering my family around our table. I can't help but think of the neighbors in our community who are struggling to put food on theirs.

In this issue of The Harvester, we share our 2023 County Impact Report. You may be surprised by the city data — people may believe our primary focus is feeding the unhoused population, which we do, but the latest census revealed about 2,500 people in Ventura County are experiencing homelessness.

Those we serve are working individuals, some in lower-wage jobs, some struggling business owners, seniors on fixed incomes and single parents, and individuals with chronic illnesses or disabilities. The common denominator is that these are our neighbors, our friends, the parents we meet in school drop-off, those who serve us, or those alongside us in the line at the supermarket.

With the rising costs of living: rent, utilities, food, and gas, we've seen a staggering increase in neighbors seeking food assistance this year. 267,000 people depend on us and our 221 distribution locations each month. To put it into perspective, Food Share is currently serving more people than we did during the height of the 2020 **shutdown** — the highest in our 46-year history.

However, while the need has grown, disaster relief funds have dwindled, and economic instability has decreased donations significantly. Consequently, we are no longer able to purchase as much food as we did during the pandemic. Although we are working tirelessly to increase food donations and

finances, we still need your support.

We are projecting to provide approximately 17 million meals this year. It will take all of us to ensure we can feed everyone in our community who is food insecure.

During this season, let's take a moment to reflect on how each of us can make a difference. Every gesture of support, no matter how small, goes a long way in helping us ensure that no one in Ventura County goes hungry.

Ventura County Impact Report 2023 Allressing Fool Insecurity

One in four people in Ventura County struggle with food insecurity.

Last year, Food Share distributed over 19 million pounds of food valued at more than \$59 million.

We support 174 agency partners and food pantries throughout Ventura County and receive rescued donations from more than 125 retail partners, growers, manufacturers, and individuals.



Allressing the Diaper Neel in Ventura County

While food is a crucial need, diapers are another essential item that many



The inability to afford diapers can have severe consequences. Babies who are not changed frequently enough are at risk of developing diaper rash, infections, and other health problems. Parents may also face added stress, knowing they cannot provide this basic need for their children. Additionally, many childcare centers require parents to supply diapers, meaning that a lack of diapers can prevent parents from working or attending school.



According to the National Diaper Bank
Network, Diapers can cost up to \$100 a month,
creating a significant burden for low-income families
who already face financial challenges. Recognizing this, Food Share
is a proud member of the California Association of Diaper Banks.
This network has been actively advocating, raising awareness,
and addressing diaper needs across eleven counties throughout
California. Food Share was successful in securing funds from
the CA State Diaper Program, which allows us, for the first
time, to purchase diapers, wipes, and Pull-Ups for infants
in our county. In August, Food Share started to receive
